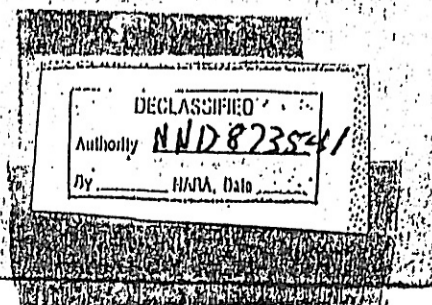

The year 1970 opened with 1/7th Cav conducting Combat operations in War Zone C from FSB Ft Compton. On 1 Jan at 0900 hrs at Grid 942101, D Co's 3/6 element, sprang an ambush at 20 meters on 03 NVA. A sweep of the area revealed 03 NVA KIA in green fatigues with 03 AK-47's and 03 Bags of rice.

On 4 Jan at 1900 hrs at Grid 046237, A Co's 3/6 CP sprang an automatic ambush on NVA coming down an E-W trail. They recovered 01 NVA WIA POW, 02 AK-47's and 01 pack. The NVA POW stated he belonged to the 50th Regiment, 212th Bn, 2nd Heavy Arms Company.

On 5 Jan about 1015 hrs at Grid 044248, A Co 1/6 element sprang an automatic ambush on 02 NVA resulting in 02 NVA KIA, 01 AK-47, and ruck sack. At 1049 hrs A Co 2/6 element sprang an automatic ambush on 02 NVA resulting in 02 KIA, and captured 02 AK-47's and ruck sack.

During the first two weeks of January, instructors from Division level worked with all elements of 1/7th Cav conducting classes on the automatic ambush.

On 15 Jan about 1300 hrs at Grid 979161, E Co 3/6 element popped an automatic ambush which resulted in 02 NVA KIA, 01 NVA WIA POW, with following weapons; 01 AK-47, 01 SKS, and 01 M-2 Carbine.

On 15 Jan about 1850 hrs at Grid 906138, C Co 2/6 element spotted 04 NVA moving south down a stream bed and then onto a trail. The 4 NVA walked past 2/6 element into an automatic ambush resulting in 01 NVA KIA with heavy blood trails.

The month of February proved a one of light contact. On 8 Feb about 0905 hrs at Grid 101223, E Co 3/6 element had an automatic ambush detonate resulting in 02 NVA KIA with 02 35lbs packs.

On 14 Feb about 0920 hrs at Grid 105311, D Co 3/6 element had an automatic ambush blew getting 05 NVA KIA and 01 NVA female WIA POW, plus 01 M-1 Carbine and 03 AK-47's. POW stated she belonged to the C-113 Transportation Unit of Phouc Long Province. Again on 15 Feb, D Co had automatic ambush triggered at Grid 106318. Sweep of the area revealed 02 NVA KIA with documents revealing KIA were with a group of 19 people.

The first action of March occurred on the 7th when D Co found a bunker complex with 150 plus bunders and fighting positions at Grid 170327. On 12 Mar at 1225 hrs, C Co had an automatic ambush detonate. While sweeping the area, C Co received sporadic small arms fire. The element pulled back putting in artillery and Rash 32 gave air support. Another sweep at 1120 hrs met enemy resistance. Results

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of moving actions were 02 U.S. WIA and 06 NVA KIA from automatic ambush. Contact continued that afternoon with enemy B-40 fire causing 02 U.S. KIA. One of the U.S. WIA became a MIA.

C Co on 14 Mar at Grid 012106 captured a Viet Cong 1st Lieutenant who was wounded in the leg. The LT stated he was with the 275th Regiment, 5th VC Division, Doan 35, 5th VC Div Headquarters.

A cache fine was made by A Co on 15 Mar at Grid 046239. Uncovered were 27,000 AK-47 rounds and 100 charges for 82mm mortar. At 1650 hrs on the same day C Co 43 element at Grid 007103 in an old bunker complex discovered the tube and bipod of a 120mm mortar. The weapon was in excellent condition even though the complex had been hit by a B-52 strick.

At 1750 hrs on 23 Mar, the 01 element of B Co at Grid 977107 spotted an unknown size enemy element and engaged. The enemy returned a heavy volume of small arms fire. Artillery and ARA were called in. Contact broke at 1735 hrs. A sweep of the area revealed 01 NVA KIA w/SKS rifle and a heavy blood trail. No U.S. casualty were taken.

The major action for 24 Mar was by B Co 73 element at Grid 973113 at 1300 hrs. 73 was engaged by small arms, B-40, and claymores. 73 called in artillery and an air strike. At 1500 hrs, 73 attempted an area sweep. They were engaged by 8-12 individuals. A second sweep was met by heavy fire. Final casualties figures were 03 NVA KIA and 06 U.S. WIA (all treated in field and released for duty).

B Co on 26 Mar located 250 lbs sacks of rice at Grid 977107. Shortly thereafter 04 heavy duty bicycles were found 150 meters southeast of the rice cache.

At 1003 hrs B Co at Grid 979111 while working a trail received small arms and B-40 fire. Contact finally broke at 1045 hrs. Results were 01 NVA KIA and 05 U.S. WIA. B Co at 0800 hrs on 30 Mar put 03 automatic ambush sites at Grid 982107, 985105, and 986106 which resulted 05 NVA KIA, 03 AK-47's, 01 9mm pistol, 03 packs, and documents.

E Co, reconnaissance squad, at Grid 967067 between the hrs of 1700 and 0200 hrs on 2 Apr, received a total of 08 rounds of 82mm mortar rounds impacted no closer than 150 meters to the south of their position. All rounds failed to detonate.

E Co again on 11 Apr had contact at Grid 078186 at about 1040 hrs engaged 03 NVA on a NE-SW trail. Results were 01 NVA KIA and 01 AK-47 captured. The other 02 NVA evaded to SW. E Co at 1725 at Grid 075173 detonated a claymore in 02 NVA KIA and 02 AK-47 rifles.

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FSB FRANCES

15 Apr - 13 May

On 14 FSB Ft Compton was closed out and 1/7th Cav moved its tactical operations to FSB Frances in Eastern War Zone "C". On 17 Apr C Co swept the area after automatic ambush detonated at Grid 573743 and found 03 NVA KIA, 04 AK-47's, 01 RPG launcher, 12 60mm rounds, 12 Checom grenades, and 02 full ammo clips for machinegun.

C Co 13 element was engaged at 1013 hrs on 18 Apr at Grid 582770 by squad size force. Contact broke at 1040 hrs with enemy evading north. A sweep lead 13 into a bunker complex. There were 01 AK-47 and 400 lbs of rice found.

Contact continued to be light for the rest of Apr. B Co on 23 Apr engaged 02 NVA at 30 meters resulting in 02 NVA KIA as well as 01 AK-50 and assorted documents that identified the individuals as members of the 50th and 83rd Rear Service Groups.

B Co 26 element at 551767 had an automatic ambush detonatic resulting in 03 NVA KIA. Captured were 01 B-40 launcher and 02 AK-47's.

On 27 Apr C Co 13 element at 605733 at 0925 moving West on an E - W trail set up a hasty ambush against platoon size enemy force, killing 01 NVA. At 0945 C Co (-) moving to essect 13 element met with platoon size element receiving small arms and B-40 fire resulting in 02 U.S. KIA and 18 U.S. WIA. C Co (-) moved back and called in AAA, part (A/S) and artillery blocking fires. 30 cal fire ground to air was received by LGH but no hits. Last sweep of area revealed an additional 02 NVA KIA. Totals were 03 NVA KIA, 02 U.S. KIA, and 18 U.S. WIA. Later on that afternoon of the 26th, A Co had automatic ambush detonate at 622758 resulting in 03 NVA KIA, 02 AK-47 and documents.

At 1530 hrs on 29 Apr at grid 630742, A Co 13 element went to set up an AA and spotted 01 individual, thereupon, engaging him with negative section fire. On a sweep of the area the 13 element received B-40 and small arms fire. Artillery, AAA, and Rash were all called in with contact breaking off at 1620 hrs resulting in 04 NVA KIA, 01 U.S. KIA, and 10 U.S. WIA. Medivac bird at 1730 hrs received G/A fire and was down without mishap. Contact was reestablished at 1810 hrs by A Co 13 and 26 element when they received B-40 and small arms fire. Contact broke at 1820 hrs with results of 02 NVA KIA, captive of 02 60mm tubes with 06 60mm rounds and 08 82mm rounds. At 1905 hrs A Co 66 element at Grid 631742 received B-40, small arms, and Chicon claymore fire. Contact broke at 1920 hrs resulting in 01 U.S. KIA, 06 U.S. WIA with negative enemy kill.

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FSB RANCH

14 May - 31 May

On 13 May 1/7th Cav moved into Cambodia, setting up FSB Ranch at Grid 938367. Immediately element of 1/7th Cav began to discover large bunker and training complex. FSB Ranch on the 14th received 03 rounds of 107 mm rockets. These were negative casualties and light damage. At 0245 hrs on 16 May, radar at FSB Ranch detected heavy movement on an azimuth of 1750 mils and 100 meters. Approximately 25-30 sappers hit the FSB with B-40, AK-47, and AK-50 fire from the east and southeast side of the FSB. The enemy was engaged with direct 105mm fire, 81mm mortar fire, 155mm howitzer, and ARA fire. Contact broke at 0320 hrs resulting in 08 NVA KIA, 02 AK-47's, 03 AK-50's, 01 B-40 launcher, and approximately 80 Chicom grenades. U.S. casualties were 05 U.S. KIA and 26 WIA.

C Co on 17 May while moving out of its NDP position at Grid 927364 received sniper fire from 3-5 individuals resulting 04 U.S. KIA and 05 WIA. A sweep of the area revealed negative enemy findings. On the 18th FSB Ranch took 02 B-40 rounds incoming from the NW, with negative damage or casualties. Rounds impacted on east side of perimeter outside the berm. Contact was to continue through the rest of May.

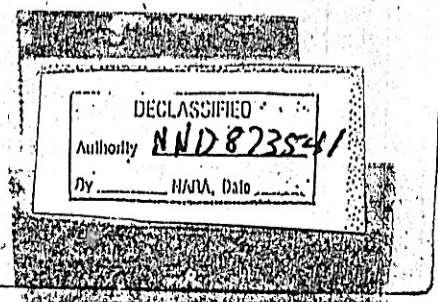
On 19 May B Co 18 element walked into a bunker complex at Grid 931386 and engaged enemy coming out of bunkers, resulting 04 NVA KIA, and 02 U.S. WIA. A sweep of the complex on the morning of 20th resulted in a 45 minute contact with 02 U.S. WIA and 01 NVA KIA. B Co again made contact on 22 May at Grid 929385. 03 individuals were engaged resulting 02 NVA KIA and 02 AK-47's captured.

On 24 May C Co hit a bunker complex at Grid 903369 receiving small arms fire resulting in 01 U.S. KIA and 01 WIA. Artillery and ARA were called in. C Co moved back into the complex clearing 05 bunkers with 02 NVA KIA. The company then came under heavy B-40, small arms, and 82mm mortar fire resulting in 04 U.S. KIA and 25 U.S. WIA. Contact ended late in the day.

A Co on 26 May discovered a 15,000 lb rice cache at Grid 954434. Also A Co at 1200 hrs engaged 03-05 individuals resulting in 01 NVA KIA, 01 01 AK-47's, and 03 trails. On 27 May, the Cav received light contact resulting in 02 NVA KIA and 01 U.S. WIA. On 28 May E Co Recon made a valuable discovery of 02 2 1/2 ton trucks at Grid 998387. The trucks were old and battered, but still operational. Numerous contacts were made on 29 May by 1/7th Cav elements resulting in a total of 10 NVA KIA and 01 NVA POW.

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A Co at 1556 hours on 2 May at Grid 629737 made contact moving against a bunker complex of over 125 bunkers. Artillery pounded the complex, as A Co then began to sweep the area they were by small arms and B-40 fire. They pulled back and called in artillery again. A second sweep and negative resistance. The continues sweep revealed 11 NVA KIA with only 01 U.S. WIA

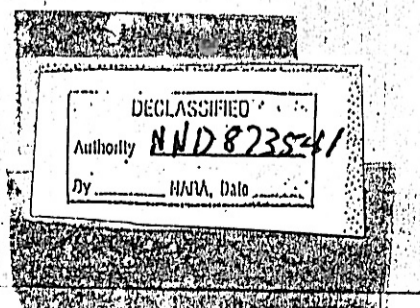


FSB CORRAL

01 Jun - 07 Jun

FSB Ranch was closed on 31 May as 1/7 Coy moved to FSB Corral at Grid 930538 with the new FSB receiving rounds of unknow type outside the berm. Negative damage or casualties.

+ On 2 June D Co had several automatic ambushes detonate resulting in a total of 05 NVA KIA, 05 AK-47's, and 01 SKS. E Co also made contact with several individuals resulting in 02 NVA KIA and 01 AK-47's. FSB Corral took 10 rounds of unknown type incoming. On 7 June, Company A, C, and E made contact resulting in 03 NVA KIA.



FSB BRONCO

08 Jun - 24 Jun

On the 7th, 1/7th Cav moved from FSB Corral to FSB Bronco at Grid 815510.

On 11 June FSB Bronco at 0530 hrs took 15 rounds of enemy 82mm mortar fire. All rounds impacted in the woodline to the south. Negative damage or casualties on the firebase. Again on 16 June FSB Bronco received a total of 08 82mm mortar rounds on two separate occasion. . Negative damage or casualties were report.

The 15th of June was a day of heavy contacts. Late in the evening of 14th A Co made contact with 10 individuals who fired 15-20 rounds of B-40 and small arms. Artillery, AAA, and a flareship were called in. Results of contact were 02 U.S.KIA, 24 U.S. WIA, and negative enemy assignments. At 0830 hrs on 15th B Co 68 element moved out to cheat a automatic ambush which blew at Grid 834472. The element received small arms fire from 3-7 individuals, result was 04 MVA KIA and enemy evaded to east. Also on the same day FSB Bronco took 07 rounds of 82mm mortar fire resulting in 03 U.S. WIA. At 1615 hrs D Co at Grid 835111 engaged 02 individuals, then received 15 B-40 rounds, small arms fire, and estimated 25 rounds of 82mm mortar fire. Contact broke at 1640 hours with a sweep revealing 08 MVA KIA with 06 U.S. WIA.

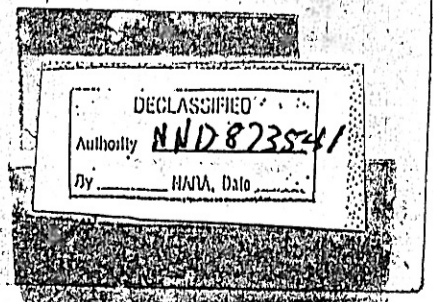
On the 19th of June FSB Bronco received 50-60 rounds of 82mm and 120mm mortar fire. Results were 02 U.S. WIA and light damage to FSB. Again on 23 June, FSB Bronco took incoming on 3 separate occasions. Light damage and 13 U.S. WIA were recorded, FSB Bronco received 09 rounds of 82mm mortar fire on 24 June resulting in 02 U.S. WIA.

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FSB RAMADA

25 Jun - 08 Jul

On 25 Jun FSB Ramada was opened up at Grid 978312. On the 29th the last of 1/7th Cav troops pulled out of Cambodia.



PHOUc VINH PALACE GUARD

09 Jul - 11 Aug

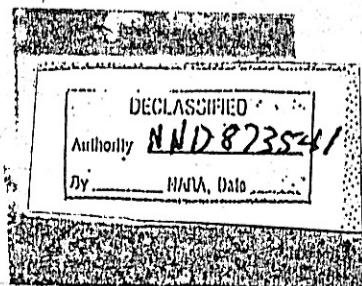
FSB Ramada was closed out on 8 July as 1/7th Cav moved to Phouc Vinh in War Zone D to take over this area of operation and Place Guard. The main mission of 1/7th Cav was to interdict enemy supply routes and prevent mortar/rocket attacks on Phouc Vinh.

On 15 July at 0745 hrs, B Co 55 element reported on their automatic ambush which blew the previous night. The result was 03 NV KIA, plus a captured 01 M-16, and 03 7.62 pistols.

On 18 July, 1/7th Cav Nini-FSB Cara Camile took a total of 10 rounds of 82mm mortar fire which resulted in 06 U.S. WIA. On 23 July, Phouc Vinh received 10 rounds of 82mm mortar fire resulting in 02 U.S. WIA. Camp Gorvad received 5-7 rounds 75mm recoilless rifle fire resulting in 01 U.S. WIA.

On 26 July at 2045 hrs, Camp Gorvad took 15-20 rounds of 120mm mortar fire. The 1/7th Cav took all casualties with 05 U.S. KIA and 11 U.S. WIA. The 1/7th Cav continued to find trail network with recent activity and old bunker complexes which had been used again.

D Co at 1230 hrs on 3 Aug at Grid 135646 found a cache. The cache was under a dirt mound with a plastic cover over it. The cache contained 854 Chicom grenades, 03 82mm fuses, 03 82mm rounds, 04 anti-tank personnel mines fuses, 04 anti-personnel mines, 10 57mm RR warheads, 900 .30 cal rounds, and 10 75mm rounds. On the same day E Co Recon engaged 05 VC moving on a trail resulting in 02 VC KIA and 02 AK-47's captured with 01 U.S. WIA. On 4 Aug a POW surrendered to the 1/7th Cav. He was a wounded mail carrier who was a VC. On 8 Aug 1/7th Cav turned Place Guard over to the 2/5th Cav and went over for a 3 day Standdown to Bien Hoa VIP Center.



On 12 August , FSB Green was opened in War Zone D at grid YT 331751. E. Co. Recon working this area had an automatic ambush detonate on 16 Aug at grid YT 334794 . The result being 02 VC KIA and 2 SKS'S taken. The next day A Co. had an automatic ambush detonate resulting in 02 VC KIA and 02 AK-47.

On 22 Aug , D company 3rd platoon was ambushed by 5 to 6 individuals resulting in 04 us KIA.

D Co. (-) on 27 Aug at grid YT 290812 engaged 7 to 8 individuals resulting in 03 NVA KIA and 01 9mm pistol captured.

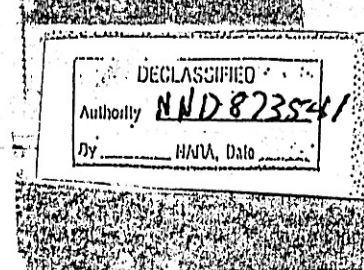
On 29 Aug , 5 Chieu Hoi's walked onto FSB green, 2 men and 3 women. One male Chieu Hoi lead to the discovery of 1 SKS.

At grid YT 230718 on 31 August , A Co engaged 03 VC carrying packs, at a distance of 30 meters . The result was 01 female VC WIA . Captured was 250 lbs of flower and 75 lbs of shelled corn. The 1st day of September saw A Co. make contact again at 1:05 hours at grid YT 223716 . While working with a tracker team they were engaged by Chicom claymore and small arms fire by 05 individuals . The result was negative casualties by both sides. The next day a Co was ambushed by 05 individuals with Chicom grenades and small arms. The VC evaded, but 02 VC KIA was recorded when he ran into an automatic ambush set up by A Co. previous to the contact. The 4th of Sept., A Co made contact in the same area with 01 VC KIA , 01 AK-47 captured, and 01 B-40 launcher captured .

B Co. (-) at grid YT 266779 at 1110 hrs. on 5 Sept while checking on a trail received 20 rounds of 60mm mortar fire resulting 14 U.S. WIA . After this contact later on in the week on 9 Sept. B Co. found a cache at grid YT 263776. The cache consisted of 318 B-40 rounds, 2 cases of powder explosives, 55 120mm rounds , and 153 picks and shovels. Two more caches were found by B Co. on the 10th of Sept. in the same area. Major items were 251 B-40 rounds, 152 120mm rounds, 01 case of TIT (144 Charges), and 1440 rounds of AK-47 ammunition .

E. Co. and B Co. both located caches on 12 September. There was an assortment of ammunition , medical supplies, and bicycles.

At 0630 hours on 13 Sept at grid YT 269768, D Co. made heavy contact receiving small arms , claymore, and mortar fire resulting in 01 U.S. KIA and 7 U.S. WIA . Enemy assessments were 11 VC/NVA KIA . SIGNIFICANT activity.



for 18 September was the walk on of 14 Chieu Hoi's on to FSB Green, consisting of old men, women, and children. Several small caches were found during the period from 13 through 21 September by various 1/7 Cav companies. These caches consisted usually of weapons and ammunition. Also VC/NVA when in contact continued to evade at the first opportunity rather than fight.

At 1850 hours on 28 September, FSB Green received 02 rounds of 75 mm Recoilless rifle fire impacting Southeast of the FSB. Results were negative damage and negative casualties.

Activity for October began on the 5th of the month when D Co. found a large number of generators and mortars at grid 271666.

In the time period from 10 to 12 October, A and D Co. discovered one of the largest caches ever found in Vietnam and the largest cache since the Cambodian operation. On the 9th, 1st platoon of A Co. found a freshly made trail with use in the last 20 minutes. Movement was detected, as the platoon prepared to set up an automatic ambush it was engaged by small arms and B-40 fire resulting in 01 U.S. KIA and 3 U.S. WIA. The indications immediately pointed to a cache being defended by the 81st rear service group. Continued sweep of the area from the 10th to the 12th of September turned up the following items:

47x 60mm mtrs complete...also 20 destroyed by arc light.
34 x ChiCom Light MG Type 56-1...18 also destroyed by arc light.
2 x ChiCom Light MG Type 56.

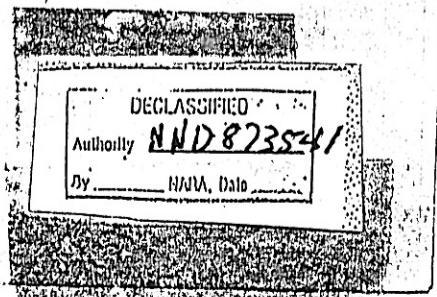

On 15 October, C Co. destroyed 20 small ammunition caches which were destroyed in place. Only 10 lbs contents were recorded for the next part of October.

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On 02 November FSB Green was closed and FSB Durall became headquarters for the 1st Bn 7th Cav . FSB Connell had been opened in Late October, and the battalion would continue till the end of 1970 to operate two fire bases. activity continued to be very light through November.

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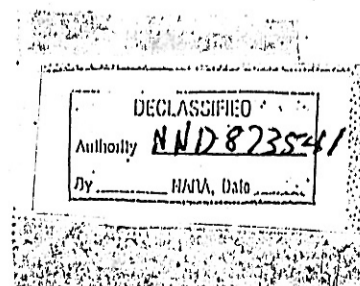
On 20 November 1970 FSB Green was opened again as the 1/7 operational headquarters, and remained in operation till early months of 1971.

During the 19th and 20th of November, while Green was being opened again, A Co, located a large village bunker complex with heavy recent use. A quantity of weapons parts, tools, bikes, and ammunition was found.

The next significant activity occurred on 7 December when an element of C Co. came upon 07 armed individuals harvesting rice. C Co. engaged with organics resulting in 04 VC KIA and 01 VC POW, and 04 AK-47's . Also 01 M1 Carbine was captured.

E Co. on the 15th of December located a cache at grid 323512. Among items located were 1,000 fragmentation grenades, 2,000 anti-tank mines, 500 B-40 rounds, 5 RPG-7 launchers, 10 heavy 7.62 machine guns , and 05 anti-aircraft .51 cal. .

For the remainder of the month there was little significant activity. Several small caches were located during this period consisting of mainly food stuffs, ammunition, and old weapons.
