

Personally appeared before me the undersigned, authorized by law to administer eaths, one Ralph O. Grette, Captain, 0-1290237, Company G, 109th Infantry, who being duly swern, deposes and says:

Upon questioning by me, Pvt. Eddie D. Slevik, 36896415, Cerpany G, 109th Infantry, stated that en 25 August 1944, he was a member of this company, and that the company was ordered to leave fexholes, and move out to a new position. He stated that he thoroughly understood the order, and decided not to accompany the organization. Instead, he remained in his fexhole until after the company moved out. The following day, 25 August 1944, he joined the Canadian M.P.'s and remained there until on or about 4 October 1944.

Upon arrival at Campany CP Pvt. Slovik reported to me where upon questioning he made above statement. I assigned him to the Fourth Platoon and turned him over to Lt. Owens, the Platoon Leader. I also gave him explicit instructions not to leave the company area without my permission. He said, "Yes Sir," I then asked him if he thereughly understood my instructions, he again said, "Yes Sir." The Platoon Leader then took him to his platoon area where he was introduced to his squad leader.

At 1700 Pvt. Slevik, without proper authority, approached me and requested that he be placed under arrest. I asked him why. He answered, "I want a courts martial for being AWOL." I then placed him under arrest, and guards returned him to his plateon area.

At about 1300, 8 October 1944, Pvt. Slebik inquired of me, "If I leave now will it be desertion?" I answered, "Yes." He then left me and went off in the direction of his plateon area, and has not been seen since.

The answer to this question was yes. He said he knew if the company went to the front he would desert again. I then referred him to the Company Commander.

STATEMENT

23 October 1944.

On or about 25 August 1944, in the vicinity of Damville, France, I received from Captain David D. White, Assistant Adjutant General, 28th Infantry Division, one hundred twenty-nine (129) replacements assigned to the 109th Infantry. I broke them down to company assignments. Fifteen (15) were assigned to Company G, including Private Eddie D. Slovik. I then personally transported them to the Regt'l Command Post, located near Elbeuf, France, where I turned the second battalion replacements over to Captain Henry P. Dobbins, Adjutant, Second Battalian.

Private Slovik was never dropped from duty to AWOL on the Morning Report of Company G about 25 August 1944. There is no entry showing him ALOL to duty about 8 October 1944, when he was returned to his company. An entry appears 9 October 1944 showing return to his company. Telephone inquiry 17 October 1944 indicates that neither his company nor battalion knew of his return. 1st Sergeant John C. Werkel, 20301165, Regimental Headquarters Company, advised that he is confined in the Regimental PW Inclosure.

An extract from First Army Provost Marshall, List No. 6, attached hereto, indicates that he was turned over to 507th MP Battalion, 7 October 1944. A letter from the Canadian unit to which the soldier attached himself during his absence is in the hands of 1st Sergeant John P. Bruch, 20303006, who has been evacuated.

Payment of proceeds of National Service Life Insurance is precluded by statute (Title 38, Section 711, U. S. Code) in those cases where death is inflicted as a lawful punishment for crime or military or naval offenses. The same provision of law provides for forfeiture of all rights to such insurance to those persons guilty of desertion.

This is in reply to your letter regarding the court-martial and execution of Private Eddie D. Slovik.

Your comments concerning this case are certainly understandable. War is always tragic in its consequences.

One should, however, be wary of the false clarity of hindsight. When judgment was passed on Private Slovik, this nation was engaged in a desperate struggle with a power which had come dangerously close to enslaving mankind. The lives of thousands, both those on the battlefield as well as those in the infamous death camps of the Third Reich, depended upon the rapid prosecution and termination of the fighting. Shortly after Private Slovik's trial, American forces in Belgium were suffering heavy casualties in the enemy onslaught which has come to be known as the Battle of the Bulge.

When the Army Assistant Judge Advocate General transmitted the Board of Review's decision in this case to General Eisenhower, the then Commanding General, European Theater of Operations, for his consideration in determining whether to approve and order the sentence executed, the following points were made. Private Slovik had performed no front line duty and his conduct demonstrated a deliberate intent to avoid such hazardous service by obtaining incarceration in a safe place. The sentence adjudged

was more severe than he had anticipated, but the imposition of a less severe punishment would only have accomplished the accused's purpose of obtaining freedom from those dangers which his comrades were required to face daily.

All of the above factors should be remembered when attempting to understand the tragedy of Private Slovik's case.

The final disposition of the remains of the Dead of World War II was carried out under the provision of Public Law 383, 79th Congress and Public Law 368, 80th Congress which authorized the Secretary of War, upon application by the next of kin, to return such remains to the homeland of the decedent.

In the case of Eddie D. Slovik, there is no record that his next of kin requested return of his body and in the absence of such request, his remains were interred in Oise-Aisne Cemetery, France. A provision of the law specifically ended all authority to make further disposition of the remains on and after December 31, 1951.

Because of his status he would not be eligible for burial in Arlington National Cemetery.

INSTRUCTIONS

C.M. Form 9 — Review of Staff Judge Advocate (Numbers refer to paragraphs of the Review)

NOTE: This review will be made in four copies, the original and one carbon copy to be bound with the record of trial, the remaining two copies to be filed in the office of the staff judge advocate. In appropriate cases a copy of the review should be furnished by the staff judge advocate to the president or trial judge advocate of the court which tried the case.

2. SYNOPSIS. Observe the following general rules in filling in blank spaces:

Age (nearest birthday): State age at the time of the offense.

Length of service: State approximately, e.g., "2 yrs.", or "31/2 mo.".

Reversible errors . . . : Enter "None", or "Yes. See Op. ..., below".
Findings of court legally sustained: Enter "Yes", "No", or "With exceptions noted". Where? (place of conf.): Enter "Pen.", "D.B." (disciplinary barracks) or "local".

Gist of Offense (charges): State briefly, omitting all details (times, places, names of persons, etc.) unless of especial significance.

Legally sustained (charges): Enter after each finding "Yes", "No", or With exceptions", unless the finding is "Not guilty", in which case enter a dash in this column. If the entry in this column is "No", or "With exceptions", make appropriate reference to OPINION following for a statement of particulars and reasons: e.g. "See Op.c." (referring to par. 4, c.)

NOTE: It is not enough merely to find some evidence to sustain each finding of guilty. The staff judge advocate must weigh the evidence (par. 87b, M.C.M.) 3. EVIDENCE.

Narrative summary + The evidence indicates that the secused came a. oversess as a replacement, passed through England, landed in France on Omsha seach, passed through several replacement units and was finelly assigned to the 28th Infantry Division from the Third Replacement Deput about 25 August 1944 (8-8 and 9 and Prosecution Exhibit No. 1). He was processed through pivision replacement channels and assigned as a riflemen to company a, 109th Infantry (Prosecution Exhibits No. 2 and 3). On 25 August 1944, at Division Headquarters he was issued emmunition and dispatched with other replacements to join his company (R-9). While the group didn't know definitely what Company & wer doing, they "just imagined it was fighting" and "had a pratty strong suspicion that the division was engaged with the enemy" (R-9 and 10). They left Division Readquarters and travelled by truck for two or three hours noting "burnedout vehicles and shelled places" enroute. They made one stop at a "rest camp or something" where they dropped off their "packs" and then proceeded on to Elbeuf where they detrucked (R-10). They walked a short distance slong the edge of the city and then dug-in at about 2300 in an open lot. At 2330, the group assigned to company 9, about 15 in number, moved into the city to join the company. At that time there was considerable troop movement and shelling going on in the city (8-10 and Prosecution Exhibit No. 4). The secused remained in his foxhole "secred", when the other episcements moved out (Prosecution Exhibit No. 4 and R-10). The following day then the shelling had quieted down, he walked into the city, stayed over night in a French hospital and then according to him own story, "turned myself over to the camadian Provost Corps". He remained with the Canadians until they finally turned him over to american Military Police about "six weeks later" (Prosecution Exhibit No. 4). The Canadians had taken over Elbeuf from the 109th Infantry about 27 august and the 109th Infantry with the 28th Tivision had continued on through Paris, palgium, Lumembourg, and to the siegfried Line (R-10). The company was "generally fighting and campeigning" from that time to the date of trial (R-11 and 14). The accused finally returned to his company 8 October 1944 and was assigned to a squad by his company commander. Within an hour or so he again presented himself to his company commander and asked "if he could be tried for being absent without leave". His company commander told him be "would find out" and placed the accused in arrest in his platoon eres (R-14). About an hour later he again returned and inquired of his company commander "If I leave now will it be descriion?", assured that it would be, he immediately went absent without leave again (R-14). His company was at that time "reorganizing" (R-13) and was sotuelly in the vicinity of mochersth, melgium. Although there is no direct testimeny on the letter, it may be inferred as hereinafter explained in paragraph Ty Opinion. The following morning at about 0830 he knocked at the door of a billet occupied by the Military covernment betschment of the 112th Infantry in the town of Rocherath and saked for something to eat. He handed the cook *a green elip of paper with writing on it and said he had made a confession*. The S-1 of the 109th Infantry was called by telephone (R+15). He sent a guard who brought the accused to Regimental Bedquerters, also located in Rocherath (R-15). There the accused again exhibited his "green slip of paper", handing it to lat Lieutenent Wayne L. Murd (9-12). He turned it over to colonel Henbest. On 11 Sovember 1944 in the course of investigation, some edditional notations were indersed on the back of the "green slip" and signed by the accused, colonal Manhest and Lieutenent furd, after "everything that appears on the green slip of peper was made very clear to the defendant" (R-12). The green slip and the signature of the socused thereon were identified by Lieutenant Ford and admitted in evidence at the trial es Prosecution Exhibit No. 4, the defense expressly stating that it had "no objections to Prosecution Exhibit No. 4" (A-19). For the purpose of record, it is noted that this Exhibit is a confession written in ink on the back of a printed Post Exchange Flower Order blank. On the back of the confession and seross the printing on the order blank, the notations dated 11 October are written in ink.

a. The record of triel is legally sufficient to support the findings and sentence and is free of any error injuriously affecting the substantial rights of the senused.

continuous combat from 29 July 1044 to date. At the time the accused was sent down as a replacement to company o, his unit had recently completed fighting across the south and of the "relaice Pocket" and was then engaged in helping to close the "gecomd Pocket" and prevent derman retreat scross the reins. He was never picked up on Norming toports of his company and consequently no documentary proof of his absences was available. One of the prosecution's leading witnesses, a Private rankey, whose statement appears in the report of Investigation as CM. From 5, shoot 10, was everysted as a casualty and unavailable to testify at the trial. He had been with the accused during the latter's stay with the camadisms and had been returned with him to company a through American Military Police channels. Nattle casualties in company 7, 109th Infantry have been 152 from 29 July to 9 October and from 9 October to 15 Tovember have been 58. The witnesses come into court directly from the front lines with clothes term and modely and with very poor memories as to past detec and places. The Trial Judge advocate was repeatedly forced to lead witnesses and refresh their memories in order to obtain what the record shows.

- e. Presence of the accused with Allied military forces did not constitute a "return to military control" (Bull JAG Dep 1942, AR 345 p 251; and Bull JAG Jan 1944 pec 419).
- d. There is no direct testimony to support the allegation contained in specification 1 that the accused was returned to military control at or mear prussels, relyim". Under the circumstances, however, the place of ratura to military control is not an essential element of the offense (rig Op JAS, 1912-40 sec 416 (5), (10) and (14)). While there is no direct proof that his return to military control was "on or about 4 October 1944", this allegation may be readily inferred from the accused's written confession, wherein, after referring to the canadians he states "el'ter being with them 6 weeks I was turned over to american IF" (Prosecution Exhibit No. 4). In addition, there is the testimony of the accused's company commander that the accused physically rejoined company G on 8 October 1944 (3-13 and 14), rate of return is not an essential element in desertion to avoid hazardous duty. The offense is complete when the soldier leaves his unit with the requisite intent (270 years of geview Opinion No. 1249, 7 Mar 44, (Marchetti)).
- e. While the secured was not physically present with his company when he left the group of replacements at Elbeuf, it may be inferred that he was under military control of officers of his regiment from the feat that he had passed through Division Readquarters and was enroute to join his company (gull Jan Jan 1944, see 385). The fact that the orders of assignment, Prosecution Exhibits 1, 2 and 2, are dated subsequent to accused's actual departure is due to the delay incident to issuing written orders confirming verbal orders.
- f. There is no direct evidence to support the allegation in specification 2 that the sequeed described "at or near Rocherath, helpium". The company commander testified that he "did not remember the name of the city or town where they were located at that time". We added that the company was "reorganizing" (R-13) and had "been in some pretty heavy fighting" (R-14). However, the fact that Company 2 was located in the vicinity of Rocherath may be inferred from the Pollowing circumstances: The acqueed left his company on the night of 8 Ce tober and at 0850 the following merming surrendered to the Military government petachment of snother megiment of this pivision, the 112th Infantry, which detachment was billeted in Rocherath (R-15). The Military government Officer telephoned the Regimental Command Post which was likewise in Rocherath (R-12 and 15). The location of the Wilitary government retachment and the 109th Infantry Command Posts are definitely fixed by witnesses and it is reasonable to infer that Company 3 was probably in the vicinity of its Regimental Command Post and the occused could

not have travelled very far during the short time he was absent without leave and during which time he apparently wrote his "confession" on the "green slip". The company was actually a mile or two East of Rocherath when the accused left.

dous duty and shirk important service, to wits action against the enemy" as alleged in both specifications, is his declared intent contained in his confession "And I'll run away again if I have to go out there". The fact that gibeuf was being shelled when the secured failed to go in with the other replacements; is also significant. That he intended to desert and apparently wanted to be tried by court mertial for that effense, is indicated by his request that he be court martialled for ANOD when he first returned to his company, followed by his inquiry a little later, "If I leave now will it be desertion?", and his prompt departure when assured that it would be. In commention with "hexardous duty", the court and the Reviewing authority may take judicial notice of the fact that Rocherath, selgium is on the western edge of the Monschau Porest, about 3 miles from the serman border and singfried Line (wharton's Griminal Evidence, 11th Ed, par 18 and 39 and Mon, 1928; par 125).

h. A report of examination of the accused by the division Neuropsychiatrist, 26 Deteber 1944, in which he concludes that the accused was at the time of the offense and is now mentally same and responsible, is attached to the Report of Investigation as CW Form 5, sheet 11.

i. The acqueed's military records indicate that he was born in retwoit, Wichigan; had 8 years of grammar and 1 year of high school; is aged 25; married; and worked as a receiving and shipping checker for the regoto Motor Tivision, chrysler corporation for one year at \$40.00 per week immediately before induction. Prior to that he worked as a plumber's helper for 1 year at \$34.00 per week. Is was inducted 3 Jammary 1944 at Detroit, Michigan. His 1807 score is 94 III, aptitude Test score 111 class II. Hilitary organizations and stations are noted as: 1 seb \$4 Inpo, camp wolters, Texas (miflo); 24 July \$4 Acr an 1 Pt deorge Weads, Mc; 15 Oct \$4 gans - 270; 19 aug \$4 third Replacement topot; 30 aug \$4 company 2, 109th Infantsy. An enclysis of the several entries indicates that the accused was put on one year probation on 5 different occasions by the Juvenile Court of Detroit between 1932 and 1958 for 4 offenses of breaking and entering and one of assault and bettery. He was arrested by the betroit Police 16 lovember 1937, convicted of embezzlement of \$49.46 and sentenced to imprisonment for a term of 6 menths to 10 years. He apparently served semething less than a year in the state reformatory at Ionia because on 5 January 1939, he was again arrested by the Detroit Police, this time charged with and convicted of unlawful driving eway auto. On this he was sentenced to serve from one to 5 years in the state Frison. He was transferred to the Ionia Reformatory where he was recorded as having a sentence of 25 to 75 years, probably the result of additional time charged against him for violation of his first perole. It is understood from statements made by the accused to officers of this rivision, that there was a "shooting" involved in this later offense.

k. The sentence is excessive in that there is no authority for a court martial to impose dishenorable discharge and total forfeigures in addition to seath, for violation of the 58. However, the reviewing authority may approve the legal portion of the sentence. Attached hereto is a my advice to that affect from the Judge Advocate's Section of Headquarters European Theater of Operations, received this date. Attached also is the TMX of this headquarters, 19 November 1944, directed to the Branch Office of the Judge Advocate General, inquiring concerning this legal point.

ON Form 9 (glovik) cont'd

1. The death sentence is deemed appropriate in this case. The accused is a habitual criminal. He has never seen combat, has run away twice when he be-lieved himself approaching it and avove his intent to run again if he has "to go out there".

5. RECOMMENDATION.

a. It is recommended that only that portion of the sentence which provides that the accused be shot to death with musketry be approved and that the record of trial be forwarded for action under the 48th article of war.

b. A form of action designed to accomplish the foregoing recommendation is submitted for approval and signature.

Specification 1: In that Private Eddie D. Slovik, Company G, 109th Infantry did, at or near Elbeuf, France, on or about 25 August 1944, desert the service of the United States by absenting himself without proper leave from his organization, with intent to avoid hazardous duty and to shirk important service, to wit: action against the enemy, and did remain absent in desertion until he was delivered to United States military authorities by Canadian military authorities at or near Brussels, Belgium, on or about 4 October 1944.

Specification 2: In that Private Eddie D. Slovik, Company C, 109th Infantry did, at or near Rocherath, Belgium, on or about 8 October 1944, desert the service of the United States by absenting himself without proper leave from his organization, with intent to avoid hazardous duty and to shirk important service, to wit: action against the enemy, and did remain absent in desertion until he surrendered himself at or near Rocherath, Belgium, on or about 9 October 1944.
