I was so scared nerves and trembling that at the time the other replacements moved out I couldn't move. I stayed their in my fox hole till it was quite and I was able to move. I then walked in town. Not seeing any of our troops so I stayed over night at a French hospital. The next morning I turned myself over to the Canadian Provost Corp. After being with them six weeks I was turned over to American M.P. They turned me lose. I told my commanding officer my story. I said that if I had to go out their again I'd run away. He said their was nothing he could do for me so I ran away again AND I'LL RUN A.AY AGAIN IF I HAVE TO GO OUT THEIR.

We were sent by trucks to our organization at Elbeuf, France. We detrucked at the edge of Elbeuf and we were led by a non-commissioned officer to a open lot and he told us to dig in. About 2300 we moved again into the city to join our company. There was a great deal of confusion in trying to join our outfit, due to shelling and other troop movements but we finally joined our organization the next morning.

The last time I saw Pvt. Slovik was during the confusion of the movement that night.

22 October 1344

On or about 24 August 1944, while coming in as replacements from the Third Replacement Depot, I got as far as the 28th Casual Company. We were then assigned to Company G, 109th Infantry, ad sent into Elbeuf, France, on trucks. Private Eddie D. Slovik was one of the replacements. I had known Private Slovik since 25 July 1944, at Camp Meade, Maryland. Arriving there at about 1900, fifteen (15) of us were told to follow some non-commissioned officer into town and join our unit.

During that movement, the column was broken by enemy fire and some of us got lost, I was one of them. That evening, the town was shelled and I dug in and stayed there that night and the next morning, only. The next thing I know, when I moved onto the road that morning, there were Canadian troops in town. Therefore, I attached myself to the Canadian Provost and stayed with them. After being with them for three (3) days, until on or about 28 August 1944, I wrote to the 109th Infantry, asking them what I should do. I met Private Slovik on the third day and he also stayed with the Canadian Provost Corp. One week leter, about 4 September 2944, the Canadian Frovost Commanding Officer wrote to the 109th Infantry, asking them what he should do with us. Meanwhile, we were under their command and we cooked and drove and done odd details, including assisting with the prisoners.

One day they got a new Commanding Officer and he asked why the Provost Corp had "Yanks" with them.

'The Canadians explained to the Commanding Officer that we, Private Slovik and I, were awaiting a reply from the 109th Infantry. He explained that he would make the necessary arrangements to get us to our outfit.

Two days later, we were transported to Brussels, Belgium. We stayed there two nights and were then sent to Spa, Relgium on 7 October 1944, where we joined en American IP Detachment.

On 8 October 1944, we arrived in Rocherath, Belgium, and joined Company G, 109th Infantry.

The court proceeded to the trial of Private Eddie D. Slovik, 36896415, Company G, 109th Infantry, who, on appearing before the court, was asked by the trial judge advocate whom he desired to introduce as counsel.

The accused stated he desired to be defended by the regularly appointed defense counsel, Captain Edward P. Woods.

Staff Sergeant John S. Clapper was sworn as reporter.

Prosecution to accused, Private Slovik: To you want a copy of the record?

Private Slovik: Yes sir.

The trial judge advocate then announced the names of the members of the court present and absent.

## Prosecution:

The general nature of the charge in this case is a violation of the 58th Article of War. There are two specifications. The first specification elleges that the accused deserted the service of the United States on or about 25 August 1944 at Elbeuf, France with intent to avoid hazardous duty and to shirk

important service, to wit: action against the enemy, and remained absent in decention until returned to U. S. military suthorities on 4 October 1944. The second specification alleges that he deserted the service of the United States on 8 October 1944 with intent to avoid hazardous duty and to shirk important service to wit: action against the enemy, and did remain absent in desertion until he surrendered himself on 9 October 1944. The charges were preferred by captain Ralph G. grotte, Company G. 109th Infantry. The charges were investigated by Lieutenant Colonel William F. Train, 109th Infantry and forwarded by the commanding officer of the 109th Infantry; and no member of the court will be a witness for the prosecution. The records in this case disclose no grounds for challenge. If any member of the court is aware of any facts which he believes to be a ground for challenge by either side against any member, it is requested that he state such facts.

President: Apparently no member of the court has any ground for challenge to disclose.

Prosecution: The prosecution has no challenge for cause and has no challenge peremptorily.

Prosecution to accused: Private Slovik, you have the right to challenge any member or members of the court for cause, and any one member, other than the law member, eremptorily. Do you desire to challenge any member of the court for cause?

Defense: The accused has no challenge for cause.

Prosecution to accused: Do you wish to exercise the right to one peremptory challenge against any member except the law member? (The Law Member then explained in detail to Private Slovik his right to peremptory challenge.)

Defense: The accused has no peremptory challenge.

Prosecution to accused: Do you have any objection to any member of the court now present.

Accused: No sir.

The members of the court and the personnel of the prosecution were then sworn.

The accused was then arraigned upon the following charge and specifications.

Specification 1: In that Private Eddie D. A. Yes sir.

- Q. You saw him there?
- A. Yes sir.
- Q. About how many replacements were in your group that were assigned to Company . G, 109th Infantry.
- A. About fifteen of us sir.
  - Q. Did you see him any time after that?
- A. We moved into the city about 11:00 o'clock to join our company. It took quiteawhile because there was a lot of confusion. We moved around some but stayed close together so none of us would get lost. That's the last time.

He brought him to the orderly room where I was and asked where I wanted him put. Slovik handed me a green slip of paper. I read the green slip of paper and told the Sargeant to take Slovik to the MP's and I would call for him later. I took the green slip of paper which Slovik had handed me and gave it to the Adjutant and then turned it over to Colonel Menbest. Later on Colonel Tenbest called me down and in Slovik's presence Slovik signed the slip and then colonel Henbest signed and also me.

Q. To you wish it corrected to show the 9th of Cotober instead of the 29th? A. Yes sir. There being no further questions, the witness was excused and withdrew.

The court then at 10:50 o'clock, A.M., took a recess until 11:00 o'clock, A.M. at which hour the personnel of the court, prosecution and defense, and the accused and the reporter resumed their seats as before. Defense: Accused understands his rights as a witness and elects to remain silent but pefense requests that the Law Member advise the accused as to his rights as a witness. .
