
Dear Senator Ives:

This is in further reply to your recent expression of personal interest in behalf of Mr. Vincent Zebatto, 18 Monterey Place, Yorkers, New York, which was addressed to the Chief of Legislative Liaison.

When a member of the Army dies, a Final Statement is furnished the Seneral Accounting Office by the Army, setting forth data perinent to the deceased's pay account, for determination and payment of any amounts due. Somewer, the General Accounting Office will not volunterily process the payment of any amounts due deceased Army personnel until a claim has been submitted by the appropriate person.

At the time of the Slovik case all pay and allowances due, at the date of desertion were forfeited by that act. It appears that under the lowe, regulations, and decisions then in effect, a returned deserter did secree pay and allowances from the time of his return to military control until the time of final disposition of the case. However, in view of the certain language in recent decision of the Comptroller General (31 Comp. Gen. 665), the issue is in doubt. As stated above, final determination rests with the Ceneral Accounting Office as to any amounts due.

The Veterans' Administration is the agency designated to administer insurance claims for payments on Mational Service Life Insurance. Therefore, any legislation introduced is behalf of Private Eddie Slovik's wider would have to be sponsored by that agency or initiated by the Congress. However, it is noted that under the provisions of Public Law 801, 76th Congress, dated October 1940 (0.8.6. 36:812), any person guilty of mutiny, treason, spying, or desertion, or who, because of conscientions objections, refuses to perform service in the land or navel forces of the United States or refuses to wear the uniform of such force, shall forfeit all rights to insurance.

This is in further reply to your letter to Vice President Ford regarding Private Eddie Slovik and Mrs. Slovik.

I appreciate your concern for the welfare of Mrs. Slovik, however, the nature of the offense for which her husband was convicted precludes the granting of benefits or assistance by the Department of the Army. The granting of benefits administered by other agencies of the Federal Government is determined by the specific agencies involved and the Department of the Army's responsibility in such matters is to furnish information from Army records which may be used as a basis for determining the granting or denial of benefits by these agencies.

When judgment was passed on Private Slovik, this nation was engaged in an all-out war with a power which was dedicated to enslaving the world. The lives of thousands, both those on the battlefield as well as those in the infamous prisons of the Third Reich, depended upon the rapid prosecution and termination of the fighting. Shortly after Private Slovik's trial, American forces in Belgium were suffering heavy casualties in the Battle of the Bulge.

When the Army Assistant Judge Advocate General transmitted the Board of Review's decision in this case to General Eisenhower, the then Commanding General, European Theater of Operations, for his consideration in determining whether to approve and order the sentence executed, the following points were made. Private Slovik had performed no front line duty and his conduct demonstrated a deliberate intent to avoid such hazardous service by obtaining incarceration in a safe place. The sentence adjudged was more severe than he had anticipated, but the imposition of a less severe punishment would only have accomplished the

This is in reply to your letter regarding the court-martial and execution of Private Eddie D. Slovik.

When judgment was passed on Private Slovik, this nation was engaged in an all-out war with a power which was dedicated to enslaving the world. The lives of thousands, both those on the battlefield as well as those in the infamous prisons of the Third Reich, depended upon the rapid prosecution and termination of the fighting. Shortly after Private Slovik's trial, American forces in Belgium were suffering heavy casualties in the Battle of the Bulge.

When the Army Assistant Judge Advocate General transmitted the Board of Review's decision in this case to General Eisenhower, the then Commanding General, European Theater of Operations, for his consideration in determining whether to approve and order the sentence executed, the following points were made. Private Slovik had performed no front line duty and his conduct demonstrated a deliberate intent to avoid such hazardous service by obtaining incarceration in a safe place. The sentence adjudged was more severe than he had anticipated, but the imposition of a less severe punishment would only have accomplished the accused's purpose of obtaining freedom from those dangers which his comrades were required to face daily.

The official military personnel records of Private Slovik show that Mrs. Slovik was notified by telegram on 24 February 1945 of the death of her husband. This was confirmed by letter from The Adjutant General dated 27 February 1945.

All of the above factors should be remembered when attempting to understand Private Slovik's case.


