Dear Mr. Vice President:

I would like to extend to you on behalf of the Navy and myself personally a cordial invitation to go on active duty for training this summer for a period selected by yourself.

This training could be with a large staff, such as NATO or a fleet or force command or aboard an aircraft carrier, preferably with the staff of the Flag Officers that may be aboard.

My dear Mr. Vice President:

Regulations prescribed by the President for continuously screening units and members of the Ready Reserve require the transfer to the Standby Reserve of members of the Ready Reserve who have fulfilled their Ready Reserve obligations unless they execute a written agreement to remain in the Ready Reserve for a minimum period of one year.

It is the purpose of this letter to afford you the privilege of executing such an agreement if you prefer to remain a member of the Ready Reserve and feel that your commitments will permit you to assume the additional mobilization liabilities of that status. An agreement to remain in the Ready Reserve is enclosed for your convenience should you elect to maintain your present status.

Should you choose to remain in the Ready Reserve, administrative commitments make it necessary that this agreement be received by 1 April 1957. If you desire to be placed in the Standby Reserve-Active, you may so signify by merely not returning the agreement, in which case your transfer to the Standby Reserve-Active will automatically take effect on 1 April 1957.

As a member of the Standby Reserve-Active you would be liable for orders to active duty only in time of war or national emergency declared by the Congress after your availability for such duty has been determined by the Director of Selective Service. Under current regulations, members of the Standby Reserve-Active are eligible to participate in a non-pay status in the Naval Reserve Training Program. Members of the Ready Reserve are liable for orders to active duty either in time of war or in time of national emergency declared by Congress or proclaimed by the President and are considered immediately available for mobilization.

Nixon, our candidate for President, was in an a "Conscientious objectors" unit in world War No. 2 - that he was not in the armed forces or not on active combat duty. But it is not an official record - it is just a book on his past life.

There are some who tried in just about every way that they could think of to crucify the character of our candidate m for President, en religious grounds and in just about every way that they could think of except a fair way.
