Re: Auction of Army Medical Records of James Marshall (Jimi) Hendrix

To Whom It May Concern:

I am writing to inquire whether there is any way a third party could have legitimately obtained the original Army medical records of James Marshall Hendrix, later known to the world as Jimi Hendrix, without his permission or that of his next-of-kin.

If at all possible, I would like to hear from you soon regarding this issue. An auction is taking place on eBay June 27, 2002, of what we believe to be property that is properly the Army's, as described further below. A copy of the eBay auction listing is enclosed. Five pages of the original medical records are displayed, and the signature does appear to be Jimi's. The bidding will begin at \$20,000.

I am an employee of Experience Hendrix, L.L.C., founded by Al and Janie Hendrix (the father and sister of Jimi Hendrix). We have learned that a concern named Profiles in History is the broker through which the original Army medical records are being advertised for sale, including copies of documents in his medical records. We believe these were wrongfully removed from the Army's records, and in defiance of the privileges a patient enjoys with respect to the private information he shares with his health care providers.

James Marshall Hendrix was a Private 1st Class and was stationed at Fort Ord in California and later at Fort Campbell, Kentucky, where he was a paratrooper with the Screaming Eagles of the 101st Airborne.

According to information published on the National Personnel Records website, if the records were obtained legitimately, they were only available by written request, and with the signed and dated authorization of the individual or the signed and dated permission from the



individual's next of kin. Additionally, the website indicates that only copies, not originals, would have been made available.

We have requested that Profiles in History produce evidence that they or their clients obtained the records in accord with procedure, but they have refused.

Does the National Personnel Records Center have any record of having provided these original records to anyone, and if so, who? Failing that, I would appreciate a statement from you that it has not been the Center's or the Army's policy to provide its original records to third parties without the consent of the subject or his next-of-kin, if that is the case.

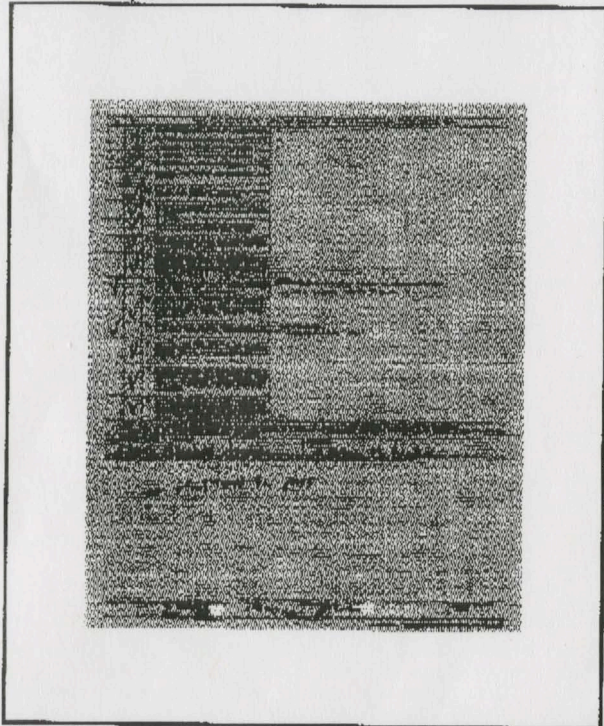

DESCRIPTION

Jimi Hendrix archive of Army medical reports. This outstanding, one-of-a-kind archive chronicles Jimi Hendrix's relatively short tenure in the U.S. Army as a young recruit, and later as a Private First Class with the 101st Airborne.

During the year Hendrix spent in the Army, he was transferred from basic training at Fort Ord, California, to Fort Campbell, Kentucky to become a paratrooper with the famed Screamin' Eagles of the 101st Airborne. While he truly enjoyed the thrill of jumping from planes, soon the regimented life on an Army soldier would wear on him, and he found his way back to his first love – music. He met a kindred spirit in his unit, Billy Cox, and the two began to perform at army bases all over the South. In the Spring of 1962, Hendrix focused his energy on getting out of the Army, and during a number of physiological and physical exams, finally convinced his superiors to set him free. It was shortly after his release from the Army in July, 1962 that Jimi made his way to Nashville and began his illustrious musical career.

Among a number of important medical documents, this archive contains, most significantly, two personally filled-out health reports, the first in which Hendrix states that he is in "good health", and the second – completed one year later – in which he describes himself as being in "fair health" with a remarkable number of ailments, including "mumps", "dizziness", "pain in chest", "frequent trouble sleeping", and "homosexual tendencies" – obviously an attempt to characterize himself as being unfit for service! The entire archive includes:

*A two page copy of his initial Report of Medical Examination dated May 24, 1961, in which his only limitation was "defective vision".

*A one page Immunization Record noting the immunizations and vaccinations he received while in the service.

*A chronological record of his Army-administered medical care, from June 21, 1961 through May 22, 1962, which includes a number of visits to the "Mental Hygiene Consultation Service". During his first visit on April 2, 1962, the attending psychologist wrote, "Individual has a good G.T. score but has been ineffectual & has been involved in disciplinary problems. Interview reveals some loss of effect at this time."

*The two sheets entitled "Report of Medical History", filled out in his own hand, the first dated May 24, 1961 with essentially a clean bill of health, and in which he lists his occupation as a "student". He also reveals that he has "stuttered in [the] past", and has signed in full "James M. Hendrix". The second, dated May 14, 1962, shows that his health has taken a remarkable turn for the worse, including the above mentioned ailments, and a listing of some of his psychological and emotional difficulties: that he "couldn't adjust to the teaching habits of a certain teacher", and that he was "having some small problems of wanting to go home." He has checked "homosexual tendencies" (contrary to his report less than one year prior) at the very end of the list, and describes his occupation as a "musician" before signing in full at the close.

Also includes a photocopy of his original death certificate (from the U.K.) which lists his cause of death as "Inhalation of vomit, Barbituate intoxication (quinalbarbitone)", with the added notation "Insufficient evidence of circumstances, open verdict", as well as a photocopy of the invoice for his funeral expenses.

A wonderful archive, tracing an important turning point in the young musician's life.

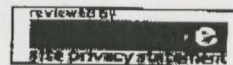

Dear Ms. Acosta:

This is in response to your letter dated June 19, 2002, seeking information about the procedures followed by the National Personnel Records Center regarding original records of former members of the United States Armed Forces. Your letter was prompted by the fact that eBay is auctioning medical records claimed to be the originals relating to Mr. Hendrix.

I have pulled the original military record from its location in our Center. It may be helpful for you to know that the record was not in our open files, but has been stored in our security vault since 1989. This is a normal procedure when we become aware of the fact that one of the over fifty million records that we hold pertains to someone who is famous for some reason. Access to our security vault is extremely limited since it also holds our collection of classified records.

A review of the record indicates that all original medical records which were present in the record were sent to the Veterans Administration Regional Office located at: 252-7th Avenue, New York, NY, 10001 on January 6, 1971. The Veterans Administration **always** receives the original records, as they use them for adjudicating claims. We checked to see where in the VA's system the claim file for Mr. Hendrix went subsequent to 1971. Their system indicates the record was last at: Veterans Administration Regional Office, Federal Building, 11000 Wilshire Blvd., West Los Angeles, CA 90024.

Please be aware that the records in question, if authentic, are the property of the Federal government. In answer to your question about the release of medical records, we would release **copies** to the next of kin if they would have been requested. We have no request on file of a family member ever requesting medical records.

I suggest contacting the Veterans Administration for the status and contents of the claims file belonging to Mr. Hendrix. The claims file number is XC-26321656.

Sir:

The transfer of original military medical records by this Center to a VA Regional Office is something that doesn't fit into the normal category of things in NARA. The records we send are never returned to us, or only in very extraordinary circumstances. The VA makes the military medical records a part of their Claims or "C" file. The "C" file will be held at the servicing VARO until the vet is deceased. At that time, the "C" file is identified as an "XC" file and is eventually retired to a Federal Records Center. The XC file belonging to Jimi Hendrix is currently located at the NARA Pittsfield facility.

So, in answer to your question, the military medical records were created by the DoD, in our custody for a period of time until the VA asks for them, and then are made part of a VA system of records. My opinion is that the VA should certainly be involved, asking for the XC folder back from us so that they may determine if the military medical records are missing or not. I do not know the disposition of the XC folders, but they are certainly long-term records of historical interest. At any rate, the auction of these records should be held up until we find out if they are the real thing.

Please let me know if you need any action from me.

Gary, et al,

Another avenue which might be useful would be for NGC to contact the E-bay legal staff or the seller to inquire about the provenance of the medical records. The description of the records indicates that these could be either original Federal records, or they may be duplicate copies of medical records filled out by the doctor and/or the patient (Hendrix) and provided to him after examinations were conducted.

I don't know whose responsibility it is to make a determination, but I think it would be advisable for both NARA and VA to try to hold or stop the auction until a conclusive determination on the status of the records can be made. E-bay stops auctions regularly for a wide variety of issues relating to their bid items, and I presume they would stop/hold this sale if valid concerns relating to the provenance of the records were brought to their attention.

I've talked with Lisa Hardzog, GC, about the pending live auction of "original medical records of James Marshall (Jimi) Hendrix."

GC has advised that if the records being auctioned are photocopies, then there is nothing we can do. If the records are originals, and we can determine that they are the property of the Federal Government, then they may be determined to be stolen and we may be able to stop the sale.

GC has requested that we check to see how the records are being advertised on E-bay (as originals or photocopies). Also, what E-bay's policies are re the sale of stolen items if they are alerted before the sale.

I'll keep you informed on what we find out.


