Dear General Ulio:

Citizens of Hutchinson, Kansas, and more particularly Mr. James Woodson, President of the Kansas Lincoln Day Club of Hutchinson have conferred with me with respect to their desire to have Corporal Joe Louis Barrow (the World Boxing Champion) as guest of honor at a big victory meeting to be held there on August 3rd. Corporal Barrow has recently been transferred to the Cavalry Replacement Training Center at Fort Riley, Kansas, for training.

Assuming that Corporal Barrow would be under the jurisdiction of the Commanding General at Fort Riley, I made inquiry of him as to whether or not Barrow would be permitted to accept the invitation to visit Hutchinson, he has advised me that since Corporal Barrow will be obliged to perform his ordinary duties at Fort Riley and will not be placed on detached service his services could not be utilized as a nationally prominent figure without direct orders from the War Department. I am therefore writing you in the hope that authority may be granted to Corporal Barrow to attend the meeting at Hutchinson on August 3rd. It will be a most important gathering since it will have to do with the Emancipation Day Celebration under the general direction of the Lincoln Day Club and other important civic groups of the community. This year's celebration will be devoted very largely to the furtherance of the war program. There can be no doubt that the presence of Corporal Barrow would contribute greatly to the success of the undertaking. I shall be very glad therefore if permission might be granted to him to accept the invitation from the Lincoln Day Club of Hutchinson.

Receipt is acknowledged of your letter of July 2, 1942, with reference to Corporal Joe Louis Barrow being allowed to attend the victory meeting held at Hutchinson, Kansas, on August 3. The question has been given careful consideration by the War Department, and it is regretted that this authority cannot be granted.

Corporal Barrow was transferred to Fort Riley, Kansas, for the express purpose of undergoing a course of training in the Cavalry Replacement Training Center, which upon successful completion should make a soldier of him and qualify him for promotion. Thereafter the War Department has plans for important work for him throughout the Army. The War Department has decided that during this period he will perform the ordinary duties required of his assignment and will not be placed on detached service nor his services utilized as a nationally prominent figure; this decision was necessitated because of the numerous recuests for his services.

Dear Senator Capper:

Receipt is acknowledged of your letter of July 2, 1942, with reference to allowing Corporal Joe Louis Barrow to attend the victory meeting to be held at Hutchinson, Kansas, on August 3. The question has been given careful consideration by the War Department, and it is regretted that this authority cannot be granted.

Corporal Barrow was transferred to Fort Riley, Kansas, for the express purpose of undergoing a course of training in the Cavalry Replacement Training Center, with a view to enabling him to qualify for promotion. Because of the many requests for Corporal Barrow's participation in various ceremonies, the Department found it necessary to to issue instructions that during this period he will perform the ordinary duties of his assignment and that he will not be placed on detached service nor his services utilized as a nationally prominent figure. Thereafter the War Department has plans for important work for him throughout the Army.

In view of your interest, it is regretted that favorable reply is not possible.
