



For your information, I learn that Sergeant Louis is to appear in Cincinnati night of February 4th as REFEREE in a WRESTLING match.



Dear Mr. Conrad:

I refer to your letter of 1 February 1944, expressing your regret that Sergeant Joe Louis Barrow was not present at the Harriet Beecher Stowe Jubilee on 21 January 1944.

The matter of permitting Sergeant Barrow to attend the many patriotic affairs at which his presence is requested has been given careful consideration by the War Department. The number of requests for his participation, however, at these and other noteworthy ceremonies has been so great that it has been necessary to adopt a policy of denying all such requests so that his services would not be diverted from the normal duties of his Army assignment.

I am sure that you will agree that to have permitted Sergeant Barrow to attend the Harriet Beecher Stowe Jubilee would have been manifestly unfair to the many other persons requesting his presence at ceremonies of note.

Sergeant Barrow was on furlough at the time of his appearance on 4 February 1944 in Cincinnati, and not under War Department orders.

I trust the above satisfactorily explains the matter.

Judge Stanley Struble of the Common Pleas Court (right) is seen handing to Attorney George W. B. Conrad the deed to the Harriet Beecher Stowe Home, Gilbert Avenue and Foraker Street, Walnut Hills. Judge Struble represented the owner of the famed landmark, Miss Mary E. Monfort, 2570 Madison Road, and Conrad is president of the Harriet Beecher Stowe Home Memorial Association, which plans to establish there a national shrine and museum to house relics, books, pictures and other articles pertaining to the lives of Mrs. Stowe and Abraham Lincoln in connection with the emancipation of Negroes from slavery. As Conrad received the deed, he handed to Judge Struble a check for \$8,500, the purchase price agreed on. This money was raised by the association through a campaign for voluntary contributions. This campaign is to be continued to secure the additional funds needed to rehabilitate and enlarge the home for museum purposes and landscape the grounds.






