4 SPARRING MATES JOIN LOUIS'S STAFF

Champion to Box at Fort Dix on Sunday as Work Begins for Abe Simon Bout

Special to THE NEW YORK TIMES. FORT DIX, N. J., March 4-George Nicholson of Mount Vernon, George Fitch from New Haven, Conn.; Dee Amos of New York City and Eddie Blunt of Corona, L. I., today were signed by Trainer Mannie Seamon to spar with Champion Joe Louis, who began training here today for his March 27 bout with Abe Simon. Seamon said there was a possibility that he might add Jim Robinson of Philadelphia to the sparring staff when the Brown Bomber dons the gloves for the first time Sunday afternoon.

Louis is sleeping late in what his trainers describe as "smoothing out" in preparation for the more rigorous training schedule.

This is the first fight in more than sixty in which the Bomber has been handled by a trainer other than Jack Blackburn, who is ill in a Chicago hospital. Blackburn is expected here a few days before Louis leaves for the Madison Square Garden fight. His comanagers, John Roxborough and Julian Black, will arrive from Chicago tomorrow or Friday.

When Louis steps into the ring of the new Fort Dix sports arena at 3 o'clock Sunday afternoon the only price of admission will be an Army uniform. Soldiers will be admitted, but the general public

has been barred.

Joe plans to rest again on Monday and resume sparring on Tuesday. Meanwhile Corporal Marty McGann of the reception center, one-time trainer of Cinderella Man Jim Braddock, is awaiting arrival of Louis's training equipment from Chicago, so that he may supervise its installation in the arena.
